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A Reminder about Inspections!

Follow-up inspection letters are expected to be sent to homeowners in early October. Note: If a violation is still found to be open after this round of inspections, homeowners will have 14 days from the date of the follow-up inspection letter to contact management and request a hearing for any open violations, if desired. Violation charges will begin accruing at \$10/day per violation starting 14 days from the date of the follow up letter. So *please* get an extension now if you need one *and* notify management as soon if you have corrected any violations. Violation charges are removed from homeowner accounts once the HOA has verified that the violations have been corrected.

Loft Ridge Community Updates

A “pedestrian refuge” or a traffic island was recently installed along Franconia Road near the Ridge View Drive entrance to improve pedestrian safety along Franconia Road. The refuge will give pedestrians a safe place to wait mid-way while crossing the road. Supervisor Jeffrey C. McKay authorized funding for the project from Lee District funds to hasten the refuge’s installation

Storm drain labeling completed through Loft Ridge. Storm drains prevent flooding by carrying rain and snowmelt away from streets and sidewalks. Unlike water from our taps and tubs, water flowing into storm drains is not treated. Labels on storm drains help remind all of us to keep storm drains and our streams clean.

Split rail fencing installed last July needs to be repaired. It was damaged by people climbing and standing on the fencing. Neighbors are cautioned not to sit, stand or climb on the fencing, and to politely request others not do so.

Bioretention Update -- Loft Ridge legal counsel and the County are finalizing our easement agreement. Once finalized, the County will schedule work to mitigate creek erosion behind Churchman Court and install a bioretention area at the end of Gypsy Court.

Common Area Grounds Update – Regularly-scheduled Fall and post-hurricane tree pruning and removals are in the process of being completed. The next round of pruning/removal will occur in Spring 2012. If you’re aware of any dead trees or damaged limbs on common area trees, please email management@loftridge.com. Mowing will continue every 7-10 days until November, with edging occurring every other mowing. Irrigation systems will be winterized and shut down at the end of September. Two leaf removals are planned for the end of November and the first week in December. Soil aeration, seeding, fall weeding/mulching and cleanup are still to be scheduled.

Attention: School Bus Danger Zone!



With school starting again, please remember to watch out for students on their way to and from school. Also, talk to your kids about the danger zones around school buses. These zones are the areas in which children are most likely to be struck by a bus because the driver cannot see them. To avoid these blind spots, children should stay at least ten feet away from a bus, and never go behind a bus. (Remember: if you’re behind a bus and you can’t see the bus’s mirrors, the driver cannot see you.) Children should also be instructed to take five giant steps when crossing in front of a bus so they can be seen by the bus driver.

Typically, the parade starts at the corner of Caprice Court and Ridgeview Drive. After the parade, there are treats, games, and maybe even some tricks!

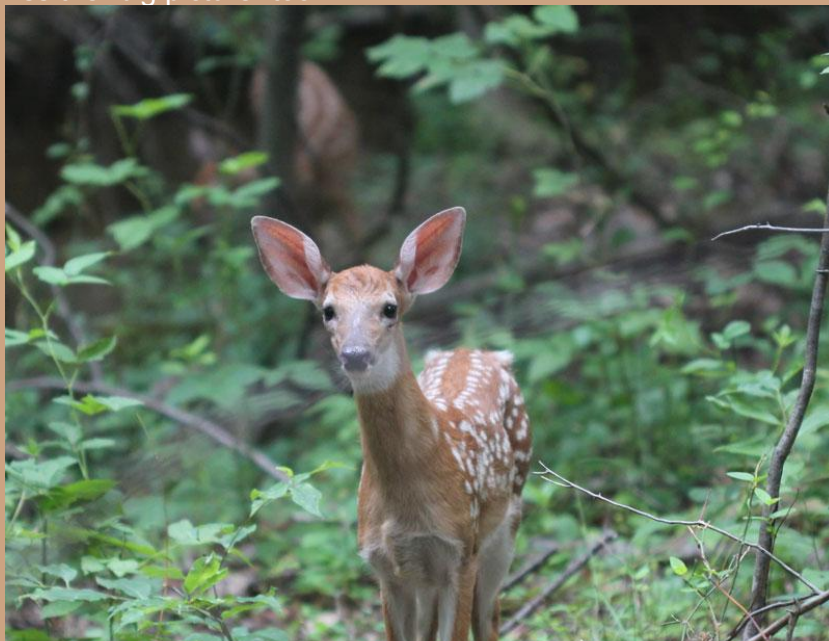

Getting the Most out of Loft Ridge Nature

The parkland surrounding Loft Ridge is by far one of the Community's biggest draws. Have you taken full advantage of all that the forest offers? Here are some tips for making the most of the place we call home.

- **Every season has its perks** - Winter may be cold, but the lack of leaves means you'll be able to see deeper into the woods than any other time of year. Catching a glimpse of a cardinal in the snow is enough to make anyone smile. Spring brings the arrival of bird migration, with dozens of breeding-plumage species, like the spectacular Blackburnian Warbler, which you won't see any other time of year. Summer brings lush forests where newborn spring fawns and other babies have plenty of places to hide. And of course Fall brings deciduous color we only get to see once a year.
- **Get out early** - Animals love the early morning hours just after sunrise. They're more active and therefore easier to spot. In the warmer seasons of spring, summer, and fall, the mornings are often the coolest parts of the day – a perfect time for a walk. Fresh sunbeams pour through the canopy, raccoons are heading off to bed, owls haven't gone to sleep yet, deer are beginning to stir, and box turtles are enjoying the day before it's too hot.
- **Walk quietly** - The quieter you are, the less you'll frighten off the natural miracles around you. (The fawn in the photo was taken by Renee Grebe. The fawn barely heard her coming, and wasn't frightened as she stood quietly watching it feed.)
- **Be aware of your surroundings** - Listen. Look up, look down, look all around. Walk at a pace that allows you to soak in the sights and sounds of the forest. Take notice of big and small things alike. Enjoy the variety of both huge trees and small, hidden mushrooms. Sometimes the smallest insects and the largest mammals are just as intriguing. Educate yourself with the things you see – find out more about how bats and spiders help keep our mosquito population down, or how caterpillars are the pre-cursors to some of our most beautiful butterflies and moths, such as the amazing mint-green luna moth.
- **Bring a camera or binoculars** - if you have them, these will allow you to capture the moment, or get a closer look at the things you might see. But don't overuse them – make sure to not miss the "big picture" too.

Help Keep the Emerald Ash Borer Out of Our Woods!

The Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) is an Asian beetle that is destroying ash trees throughout the East Coast. Here are some tips to help prevent the loss of our ash trees to EAB.

Make sure your fire wood is from local sources. Don't transport firewood; or carry it across county or state lines. Don't move firewood from your property, and definitely don't move wood out of quarantine areas. When purchasing firewood, always ask about its origins, and if it is locally sourced. Burn your remaining supply of firewood before Spring arrives to eliminate the chance of spreading the beetle to live trees. For more info on the EAB, go to <http://www.stopthebeetle.info/>.

We need the help of everyone to minimize the impact of this pest. Here are more ways you can help:

- Examine ash trees and wood piles for signs of EAB infestation, such as canopy dieback, epicormis shoots, S-shaped galleries, vertical bark slits and D-shaped exit holes.
- If you observe beetles or evidence of EAB infestations, report your sighting to your State Plant Health Director.
- If possible, take digital pictures of the insect and damage to your trees. And report the information to:

Big Props to this Year’s National Night Out Crew

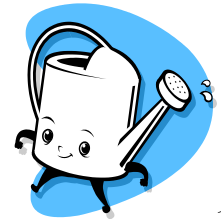
