Stream Stabilization Project

The project across from the tennis courts is almost complete. There was a long, 8' deep, channel that had developed due to erosion. The County has an underground storm water network in that area so it was their responsibility to correct this safety concern. By removing several trees, a wide path was created which allowed equipment access to the channel. Large stones were installed in a "step" fashion. The County will return in the Fall to plant shrubs and trees throughout the effected area. No port-a-potty needed, as this work should only take two or three days.

FIOS Update

Installation of **FIOS** has hit a snag. Late last year, Verizon stated it needed specific language in the existing utility easements. Our Association Attorney worked with Verizon and thought they were satisfied and Loft Ridge was on their schedule. After recent inquiries, it appears Verizon is concerned about the amount of space they have to lay the cable within their easement while maintaining the required clearance from other utilities.

Rain Garden Project

This project is in the "do we want it" phase. Rainwater eventually ends up in the Cameron Run watershed. This project will improve water quality by removing excessive nutrients that contribute to algae. It consists of digging in the wooded area at the end of Gypsy Court (facing the tennis courts), filling it with appropriate materials then adding native plants. This effort can't proceed unless **51% of the owners** consent to this work. It will cost us nothing and the County will maintain it. If you haven't signed a survey, the form and an information sheet are on the Loft Ridge website.

Texting & Driving



Effective July 1, 2013, texting while driving is a primary offense with a mandatory minimum fine of \$125 for the first offense and \$250 for subsequent offenses.

Common Grounds Update

Mowing will continue every 7-10 days until November. There will be aeration, seeding, and fall fertilization. Two leaf removals are planned for November and December. Irrigation systems will be winterized and shut down at the end of September.

School's In Session!

When bus lights and stop signs are activated vehicles must stop in both directions unless they are separated from the bus by a median. The penalty? A maximum of \$250, up to 6 points on your license, and possible suspension of your driving privileges.

The ACC will be performing re-inspections in October, so be sure your violations have been corrected.

NEWS FROM THE BOARD

The Board has decided on a Loft Ridge **website redesign**. A survey will be provided in the near future allowing you to express your preferences for items to include or exclude from the website. A quick look at the current website will aid you in responding to the survey. The sooner the surveys are completed and submitted, the faster the project can proceed.

On the landscaping front, the sprucing up of the **entrance plantings** is complete. There have also been some **new shrubs** planted at the end of Churchman Ct. along Ridge View. Some water from nearby residents would help with their survival. The Board will conduct its **Fall walk-around** in October to look for trees and shrubs that need pruned or removed.

Lee District has assumed ownership of the narrow strip of land behind the split-rail fence along Medallion Court. It will be turned over to the County Park Authority for maintenance.

Time to Prepare for Old Man Winter

Avoid Frozen Pipes

After you have watered your lawn for the last time this Fall, turn off the inside valve to your outside faucets. Then disconnect the hose and open the faucet to drain out any water in the line. This will avoid any water being available for freezing once winter arrives.



Those Fallen Leaves

Leaves can be blown or raked up and put into bags for the Wednesday trash pick-up. Clear bags are preferred but not required. The Grounds Contract stipulates leaf blowing in the Fall but that is for leaves on common ground only. Leaves aren't good for plant areas since they could be several layers deep which would block any water getting to the roots of your plants. Leaves are also slippery when wet or frozen.



Then You Need Mulch

After the unwanted leaves have been removed from your flowerbeds, don't forget an application of mulch to help protect your garden over the winter. Mulch helps retain the moisture but also has insulating value.



Clear Your Gutters

You don't want ice dams because your gutters and elbows are full of leaves. The drains could all freeze in the winter but when they start to thaw, they don't need any impediments.



Fireplace Safety

The following are a few basic fireplace safety rules: 1) Use natural logs that have not been treated with insecticides. If artificial logs, follow the directions on package; 2) Check fireplace and chimney often, keep clean, and in good repair. Should be professionally cleaned at least every other fireplace; 4) Keep damper set so draft will much air flow might let the fire get out of materials like papers, book, toys, etc.; 6) ensure everyone knows how to use it out before leaving unattended.

Halloween Safety Tips “Trick or Treat”

Ghosts, goblins, and ghouls will soon be coming out all over the area! Halloween is a festive occasion that we need to celebrate safely.

Traditional jack-o-lanterns with candles are a tremendous fire hazard. A better way to light up your jack-o-lantern is to use a small string of holiday lights with yellow and red flashing bulbs or small battery-powered candles. You’ve now created a “fire safe” jack-o-lantern that will send a chill down every goblin’s spine.

If your children are preparing to go trick-or-treating, take these safety precautions:

1. Make sure all costumes are flame retardant. Most commercial costumes are made of flame-retardant material and you should ask your fabric shop for flame-retardant material if you make your own costume.
2. Make sure your children can see and be seen. Expand the eyeholes in commercial masks to improve peripheral vision. Add reflective tape to costumes to make them more visible to motorists.
3. Ensure that each trick-or-treater has a working flashlight.
4. Tell the children to remove their masks and look both ways before they cross a street.
5. Never let a group of children trick-or-treat alone. Adult supervision is a safety “must.”
6. Trick-or-treat only at homes of people you know.
7. Instruct children never to eat candy or treats until they return home.
8. When your child gets home, inspect all the candies and fruits. Slice open the fruit to check for strange odors or any signs that the fruit has been altered or tampered with. Dispose of any treat that is unwrapped or appears to have been tampered with.

HOME FIRE SAFETY

- Develop a home fire escape plan and practice it often.
- Determine a planned meeting area outside the home.
- Have two ways to escape from every room.
- Practice feeling your way out with your eyes closed.
- Make sure children know how to unlock all doors and windows.
- Install one smoke alarm on each floor and be sure it can be heard in all rooms.
- Test all smoke alarms monthly, new batteries yearly.

DURING A FIRE

- Time is the biggest enemy and every second counts! Escape first!
- Stop, drop, and roll if clothes catch fire.
- Never return to a burning building for any reason; it may cost you your life.
- Never stand up in a fire, always crawl low under the smoke and try to keep your mouth covered.
- Never open a door if the door or door knob are hot.
