

#### News from the Board

The Board is reviewing bids for maintenance of the common grounds along with emptying of the pet waste stations. Tree removal/pruning was completed. New trees will be planted to replace the stump piles. Fall walk-around will be conducted for identification of dead or dying trees. The dead shrubs at Churchman and Ridge View are under warranty and will be replaced.

Also under review are bids for **repair of sidewalk cracks and trip hazards** as well as pressure washing and painting of **fire lanes**. The **irrigation system** will be turned off in early October. The **tot lots** have been remulched, new baby swings installed at RV tot lot and a wasp nest removed from EGK tot lot. At the **tennis courts** you will see two new nets and straps. A contract was awarded to correct the **erosion problem** at the far end of Gingham Ct.

## **County Project Updates**

The cause of the high water level in the stream under the **dip on Ridge View** has been corrected. Work is continuing on locations for the **tree box filters**, the number of which is dependent on the County's material availability. And in spite of all the signatures obtained favoring the **rain garden**, lack of County funding has caused that project to be shelved indefinitely.

The **off-leash dog park**, (see article in Summer Limelight) originally scheduled for July, appears to be on target for sometime this Fall.

## **Speeding Could End in Tragedy**

Are you going to be the driver who causes our first "tragedy" because you were speeding? Remember nothing is so important that a child is "expendable." Some of you are driving recklessly in our Community. If there is a serious accident, the driver could lose everything he/she has spent a lifetime accumulating!! And what about the child's grieving family??

## **Deer Mating Season**

Did you know that 60% of all automobile crashes in the Washington DC area happen from October through January? This is mainly due to the number of unsuspecting deer that gallop into oncoming traffic.

This time of year, deer are wandering around looking for food and a mate – and they don't necessarily restrict their hunt to forests or parks.

If you see a deer, slow down and be alert for more. Do not swerve to avoid a collision because some of the most serious accidents occur when a driver attempts to dodge a crossing deer.

## Area Construction/Revitalization

**Mulligan Rd** (now named Jeff Todd Way) opened in August. It is located just south of Hayfield HS and connects Telegraph to Route 1 at Mt Vernon Memorial Hwy.

**Springfield Town Center** is opening in October! It will feature Regal Theaters, food court, large play area, and many clothing, shoe and jewelry stores among others.

Work continues at **Telegraph and N Kings Hwy** intersection with anticipated completion this Fall.

## **Fall Landscaping Tips**

<u>Plant Fall bulbs now</u> and forget about them until next Spring. Prepare bed with rich, well-drained soil. Add planting mix and work into the existing soil to a depth of 6". Place the bulb (pointed side up!) then cover with soil mix. Water well and cover with mulch.

<u>Divide those perennials</u> to control their size, rejuvenate them and increase their numbers. There is no set rule as to when to divide them, but it is best to divide spring and summer blooming perennials in the Fall and fall bloomers in the Spring. Dividing the plant when it is not flowering enables the plant to focus its energy on growing new roots and leaves.

The most used method of dividing is to dig up the whole clump and carefully separate it into several smaller clumps. It's important to use a spade with a long, narrow blade. After removing, prune dead and damaged tissue, and make sure each section has a portion of roots and leaves. Replant the divisions in pre-prepared holes at the same depth they were originally. Water the new divisions plentifully, and keep them well-watered through their first year.

<u>Tree and shrubs</u> are best planted now. Their chances of survival are better and they are often marked down at nurseries and stores.




#### A Time for Thanks

## Fireplace Safety

With Old Man Winter soon upon us, here are some tips for you when using your fireplace during chilly months:

- Have fireplaces, chimneys, and chimney connectors professionally inspected annually
- Use only wood that is properly seasoned to reduce creosote build-up
- Make sure your fireplace has a sturdy screen to contain sparks
- Allow fireplace ashes to cool before disposing of in a metal container

**Please note:** Firewood trucks are not allowed on common ground and your firewood is to be stored inside your fence.



## **Insecticide on Firewood Can Be Dangerous**

Firewood may bring more than heat inside your home. Those people who find it convenient to bring a supply of firewood into the house may also be bringing in unwanted insects.

Dry firewood left outdoors from last year may have attracted a variety of insects. When this wood is brought indoors, the heat inside the home will stimulate the wintering insects to emerge from the wood.

The insects most commonly found in firewood include long-horn beetles, several different kinds of ants and spiders. Occasionally, these insects appear in numbers large enough to create the fear that they will become an established household pest.

These insects are commonly controlled by sweeping and vacuuming. Another method of control is aerosol insecticide but this is not a good idea. Burning wood that has been TREATED WITH AN INSECTICIDE will produce HAZARDOUS FUMES.

Because of potential insect problems indoors, it is recommended that firewood should be brought inside as it is needed.
