Loft Ridge Projects Update

In late September, a walk-through of the community was performed to identify dead and or damaged trees or trees in need of pruning. After competitively bidding the project to 4 companies, a vendor was selected and the work will be completed by early January. The next round of tree pruning and removals will take place in Spring 2013. A handful of new trees have been purchased, at a discounted price, and will be installed in areas where trees were lost due to disease or damage. The installation of these trees will be completed in early January. However, the Board maintains an ongoing list of trees needing care, so if you're aware of any dead trees or damaged limbs on common area trees, please email the Board at board@loftridge.com.

In Fall 2012, the Board commissioned an update to the Association Reserve Study. This was partly due to the extreme weather experienced over the last 3 to 4 years (blizzards, hurricanes, derechos), and partly to assess whether the funding strategy implemented after the last update put the Association at risk. The study included a detailed inspection of the Association's assets, including the various structures (curbs, sidewalks, streets) and features (tot lots, tennis courts). As part of the update, a review was made of the funds currently allocated to pay for upkeep or replacement of HOA assets, and a forecast was made as to whether the Association has been setting aside enough to pay for the potential

future projects. A draft of the study was returned and reviewed at the January meeting.

The Study shows good news! Over the last 2-3 years, we have been aggressive in our reserve saving in an attempt to correct underfunding before that time, and the study outlines how the Association is now in good position to be fully funded for all forecasted projects over the next 20 years.

In other news, the management, grounds, and snow removal contracts have also been reviewed and approved. As has been the practice in prior years, sanding will occur if there the temperature falls below freezing and ice is in the forecast. Plows will be called when snow accumulates to 3 or more inches. Please remember that homeowners are responsible for shoveling the sidewalk in front of their property. This ensures safe walking conditions for all pedestrians.

The Board is also currently reviewing the Association's collection policy, and plans to review the HOA Handbook this year.

Did you know we have a mystery writer in Loft Ridge?

Tell us about yourself and your writing.

My name is Matthew Iden, and I have been a resident of Loft Ridge since 2002. I'm a self-published crime novelist; I also write fantasy, science fiction, horror, and literary fiction. I'm a former web designer and IT consultant.

How did you get started as an author?

I've always had an interest in writing, but both a bachelor's and master's degree in English Literature guaranteed that, for years, I didn't believe anything I wrote was good enough for publication. As a result, I stopped writing altogether instead of doing what I should've, which is keep plugging away until I got better.

About ten years ago, I realized no one was going to hand me a publishing contract and I started writing in earnest. After many false starts, I finished my first crime fiction caper, *The Road to Sturgis*, in just two years! Unfortunately, I soon discovered that writing the novel was the easy part.

If writing is the "easy part, "what's the hard part?

Fiction publishing is a fickle industry that can be extremely difficult to break into. I studied the industry and the market for a year, trying to understand what made it tick. This saved me from making mistakes, but it also clued me in to the biases and restrictions that the publishing business possesses (and imposes on itself).

After seeking agent representation for several years—ultimately fruitless—and as the prospects of landing a contract started to dim, I looked into self-publishing through

Amazon's Kindle Direct Publishing program. I liked what I saw, went "all in" almost a year ago, and couldn't be happier. I'm slowly building up a fan base for my writing and have created dozens of amazing relationships through the process.

So, what's the worst thing about being a writer? Writing isn't engineering or math. There's no objective measuring stick to tell you when you've done well. Some people love my work, some people (including myself, sometimes) hate it. Being a writer—especially an independent writer—means that you have to be schizophrenic: believing you're the best thing to happen to literature since Shakespeare, while simultaneously holding yourself to such an incredibly high standard that you feel like you've failed.

And, what' the best thing about being a writer? I'm forging a career out of a passion instead of working at a job. I own my successes and failures. Not being bound to a contract to a publishing house means I have the artistic freedom to write what I want, when I want.

What are you working on now?

I have a dozen short story collections, novellas, and novels available through all the major distributors: Amazon, Barnes & Noble, Kobo, iBooks, and Smashwords. My "flagship" project is a crime thriller series about retired Washington, DC homicide detective Marty Singer, available in the novels *A Reason to Live* and *Blueblood*. I just finished the draft of *Signs*, the third book in the series, and have three smaller projects in process.

Do you have any advice for would-be writers? Writing is more difficult than most people realize. If you're just starting out, you're probably not as good as you think. But that's where everyone starts and it simply means you have to work at your craft. You need to commune with other writers, study the art, and—most importantly—actually write. Don't talk about it, don't daydream about publishing contracts or movie deals, don't just read books about it—sit down and do it!





This Old Townhouse

Looking for more storage space? Look up, look down, it's all around. Useable storage space is often available in unused areas in closets and cabinets. Here are some tips for maximizing the space in your townhouse.




Storage Challenge #1 - The Front Hall Closet


Think vertically. Wall-mounted baskets with a narrow profile can be used to store shoes, outdoor pet supplies, bug spray - you name it. These baskets free up floor space without eliminating outerwear storage space. Labeled bins up top also provide easy-access storage. (Baskets from The Container Store.)

Storage Challenge #2 - The Utility Closet

This owner made a template of an odd nook in her utility closet, constructed shelves from inexpensive plywood, and gained roughly 1' x 1.5' x 7' of storage - just enough to hold most of her craft supplies. Crafting tools too large to fit in the shelves hang neatly from wall-mounted hooks.









Waterheater Closet

Inexpensive pegboard and shelves (assembled inside the closet) allow for organized and visible storage. Screw-cap glass jars glued to the underside of stair treads provide easy

access to fasteners, without taking up shelf space. Note: Screw-cap jars work better than baby food jars (GORM shelving and RAJTAN spice jars from IKEA, 4/\$3; Gorilla Glue and peg board from Lowes.)
