Make Repairs Early -Enjoy Summer Sooner!!!

The ACC has concluded their annual inspection of Loft Ridge properties. The members found a variety of maintenance issues from minor "clean front steps" to major "repair rotten rake board." As the homes in our neighborhood keep aging, materials will degrade and get dirty/worn. Please remember that wooden decks and fences can use fairly consistent TLC. Power washing and treating with a water sealer, can make an aging deck or fence look nearly new again. In addition, please check the Loft Ridge website for the approved deck stains. There are decks out there that are stained the wrong color and older wood may cause a stain to look (much) darker than the sample shows. Opaque stains are not allowed, so please read product labels carefully. Also, as entering your home becomes routine, you may not notice those front steps getting dirty or a board starting to rot in the corner. Take 5 minutes before you walk in the front door to really look around, and you may catch the start of a problem before it gets too big to repair yourself.

If you receive your violation letter, please don't hesitate to contact someone with any questions or concerns that you have. If you don't understand what the violations are, or would like to talk to someone about the timeline to correct your violations, Kristy Faulk at Sequoia and the five members of the ACC are there to help. Loft Ridge Community Updates

Recently there have been questions about the herbicides used in the Loft Ridge community. Carter Mullen, a volunteer board member and a professional environmental scientist, provides the following information.

Americans have a fascination with big green lawns, free of weeds. They look great and are inviting to play around in. Unfortunately, lawns do not exist like this in any natural system. A natural environment would have many different species of plants, many of which humans have deemed "weeds." Our lawns are what is known as a "monoculture," a single species taking over a large area of land. From an ecological point of view, lawns are a completely artificial system created by humans for the sole purpose of aesthetics. Keeping a lawn in that condition requires some means of removing the undesirable plant species, or weeds.

If Loft Ridge wants to keep our common areas green and weed-free, we have to remove the weeds. There are only 2 ways of removing weeds: manually or with an herbicide of some sort. From an environmental and health standpoint, manual weed removal is best, but in a large association like ours, it is just not practical, in man-hours or cost. That leaves us with the other alternative: herbicides.

There has been much talk about organic herbicides, like corn gluten. Almost all of the organic herbicides are designed for small-scale operations, not large areas like we have in Loft Ridge. Corn gluten is not recommended for large-scale applications because it requires numerous, large applications over the course of the year, and does don't produce the same results as single or double application of synthetic herbicides. In the long run, corn gluten causes more runoff problems than synthetic herbicides, due to the large concentrations used during each application. This causes abnormal amounts of nitrogen to build up in the soil. Nitrogen does not break down quickly, is easily washed out by rain, and causes nitrification of surrounding rivers and streams.

Telegraph Road Construction Near Completion

The Telegraph Road Interchange reconstruction phase of the Woodrow Wilson Bridge Project is currently on schedule to be completed by late 2012.

Construction is both on schedule and on budget, said Jenny Rios, a spokesperson for the project. "That's one of the things we like to promote about the bridge project in general," Rios said. "Since its inception, we've been on budget."

According to a Winter 2012 construction update, there are three major project stages left to complete on the Woodrow Wilson Bridge Project: reconstructing 2.5 miles of I-95/I-495 from the Eisenhower Connector to the Route 1 interchange, including THRU and LOCAL lanes; building ramps for an interchange at the Beltway Outer Loop, Telegraph Road, Huntington Avenue and North Kings Highway; and improving Telegraph Road from East Drive to Duke Street.

All of this work is expected to be completed by June 2013. Rios said residents and commuters can expect to see ongoing construction on the Telegraph Road interchange throughout the rest of 2012. She said the Telegraph Road section of the project was "a little more complicated because we've got a lot of bridges that we're dealing with," including the bridges over Cameron Run and the railroad tracks.

Project officials are aiming to have the Telegraph interchange work completed by the end of 2012, according to the Winter 2012 construction update.

Phase 1 of Lee Rec Center Upgrades Completed

The Lee District Family Recreation Area continues its construction and will be a magnificent and one-of-a-kind family and play area upon its completion. This recreation area began in 2011 with completion of the Joey Pizzano Special Harbor Sprayground, a tree house, rest rooms, and a covered picnic area (temporary), all fully accessible. Over 75,000 visitors entered the Sprayground and every day was fee-free! This year, the final portion of Phase 1 of Chessie's Big Back Yard opened on May 26th, with a fully-accessible playground, primarily for children 5 - 12 years old.

Phase 2 of Chessie's Big Back Yard will be completed as funding permits. Future features of the project include a tree house-themed playground, primarily for children under 5 years of age (Phase 2), a carousel and permanent covered picnic area (Phase 3) that are all fully accessible. Snakes Alive - Don't Panic!

There have been a few recent snake sightings in Loft Ridge. These snakes met the general descriptions of black rat snakes (diamond patterned as a baby, but all black as an adult) and ring-neck snakes (all black with a yellow ring near its head). Neither type of snake is poisonous or to be feared. It can be easy to jump to conclusions that you're seeing a poisonous snake when you see an unfamiliar snake. But, don't fear — the likelihood of seeing a black rat snake surely outweighs the possibility of anything dangerous. Only three of the 35 species of snakes commonly found in Virginia are poisonous, and only one species, the copperhead, is found in Fairfax County. Please keep in mind that snakes are good to have around because, amongst other things, they keep the rodent populations down.

Let's be Safe Out There People!

Every day since Jan. 1, 2011, more than 10,000 Americans have turned 65, a trend set to continue for the next 20 years as "baby boomers" become senior citizens. 


Congrats Grover Grads!
